Stockton Sandspit Outing Tuesday March 6, 2019



Despite prediction of high temperatures for the day 24 HBOC members arrived at 7.30am eager to see waders, many waders already changing into breeding plumage before their northern migration. There was a cooling breeze off the water which made the outing more pleasant than expected. It was about one hour before high tide so flocks flew in from time to time from the dykes.

We first walked along to the Fern Bay bank where the Grey-tailed Tattlers roost, and found them along with 3 Terek Sandpipers, 1 Common Sandpiper and Whimbrels. Some of these were in the lone mangrove where they gather if disturbed under the bank. We returned to the bridge area and walked the path to the shore so that we could observe the hundreds of Pacific Golden Plover, heads poking up out of the vegetation. They had some Curlew Sandpipers and many Sharp-tailed Sandpipers with them.
