1. General Meeting 13 September 1978 Attendance 25.

Points from the Meeting:

- 1.1 A Welcome to new members: Kay and Tim Emery and Carol and Ian McKean.

- 1.3 The BIRD OF THE EVENING was the WHITE FRONTED CHAT (Epthianura Albifrons) . Questions and comments at the conclusion of this talk indicated that some interest had been generated in this bird and identification should be easier on future outings. Our thanks are due to Greg Little, Gary Weber and the Bird Observer Club of Victoria for the coloured slides which were used to illustrate the talk.
