Over 50 species were recorded and this was considered be quite good considering the time of the year. Two sightings of interest:

(i) The BROWN PIGEON (Macropygia phasianella), a most obliging bird who stayed put for quite long periods and (ii) wonder of wonders a male PARADISE RIFLE BIRD and three females (Ptiloris paradiseus). To the best of my knowledge the male bird has never been recorded before by our Group. As a result of their 'activities' over the week-end, awards were won by the following: The Best Snorer - Fred; the most industrious camper - Kay Imrie: and the accolade for the best sighting (the Rifle Bird) Olive Hamonet.

## 3. ANNUAL DINNER Friday 25 May.

18 of the 19acceptors attended this function at the Sulphide Welfare Club at ockle Creek. The food was good, the conversation stimulating and all in all it was voted a jolly good evening.
