5. June 24 Outing to CHICHESTER DAM.

ring to the petrol shortage, it was agreed - at the assembly point - to explore area closer to home. As a result a very rewarding day was spent firstly in a stroll along the coal line which traverses the Hexham swamps. Here we saw, apart from thousands of water birds, hundreds of Golden Cisticolas (Cisticola exilis) Goldfinches (Carduelis carduelis) Reed Warblers (Acrocephalus stenroreous) and a Swamp Harrier (Circus approximans) who was really harassing. Leaving this area we then spent some time in the wet lands west of Cockle Creek railway station. In all over 45 species were recorded.

6. ATLAS Outing to Weston, Abermain, Greta. Sunday 8th July Nine members attended this outing and spent quite an interesting day in this area. Unfortunately a cold westerly wind made conditions unpleasant for bird watching but despite this handicap, over 60 different species were sighted.
