1. Notes from the September Meeting:

- (a) Attendace 24 another best for 1980; a warm welcome was extended to new member Arthur Williams Arthur comes from Highfields and has been a keen bird Observer for many years.
- (b) Wader Study Group our Chairman gave a very interesting report on the inaugural meeting which was held in Melbourne on 23 August all States of the Commonwealth and New Guinea were represented; we should hear more about the activities of this group in due course.
- (c) Unusual sightings: White-breasted Sea-eagle at Muswellbrook; Sharp-tailed Sandpiper and Red-kneed Dotterel on the Krui river (near Cassilis): Spotted Quail thrush and Southern White-face in the area 21 kms south-west of Merriwa.
- (d) The FRECKLED DUCK reported last meeting has since been seen by several members but the previous lone duck now has a mate.
- (e) <u>FEES</u> Annual fees are now due to the Flora & Fauna Society but some confusion exists as to the amount payable no doubt this problem w will be clarified in due course.
- 2. BIRD CALL OF THE EVENING

 Gessel, was that of the ROCK WARBLER (Origina solitaria). Because this shy member of the bird world is so seldom seen, much less heard, it was no small wonder that members present failed to recognise the call.
- 3. GUEST SPEAKER Once again we were privileged to have as our Guest Speaker that well known conservationist Brian Gilligan.

Brian spoke about his studies of the Japanese snipe (Gallinago hardwickii) and the Nankeen Night Heron (Nycticorax caledonicus) both of which he had observed in the Seaffm swamp Nature Reserve.

The Japanese Snipe breeds in Japan and considerable numbers are known to migrate to Australia - their flight path apparently passes through New Guinea and along the east coast of Australia. Comparatively few of these birds have been banded and therefore specific knowledge of their movements is not well known.

The Night Heron because of its habit of roosting during the daylight hours, very little is known of its habits; nesting for instance is apparently difficult to locate.

Brian also spoke of his suggestions for the management of the Seaham swamp Nature Reserve. In his opinion, the area of the Reserve should be enlarged and 'tied' to the existing park situated at the southern end of the Reserve. He proposed that Nature trails be constructed so as to take in the historical features of the area such as an old slab-built house; the old stone church and the Edgeworth David quarry.

The talk was followed by an interesting discussion regarding the submissions put forward. Many thanks to Brian for an informative and stimulating evening.
