

1. MEETING Wednesday 9th December 1981.

- 1) Notes:
- a) Attendance 20 members and 1 visitor.
- b) 1982 Programme issued to members present with an explanation of necessity to ring 'contact person' in the event of petrol shortages, inclement weather or other emergency.
- c) The final draft of the proposed Constitution for the Hunter Bird Observers Club was tabled for perusal and will be presented for adoption at the Club night on 10th February 1982.
- 2) BIRD OF THE EVENING AND CALL.

This was handled by Jim Imrie in his usual efficient manner. The bird chosen was the CRESTED BELLBIRD (Oreoica gutturalis)-this one is not found in the Hunter Valley but Jim was speaking from personal sightings in the Hattah Lakes National Park in Victoria and at Pulletop in N.S.W. The call was very musical and was not unlike that of our Bell Miner. Thank you Jim for enlarging our knowledge of a bird found putation one area.

3) MAIN FEATURE

In lieu of a guest speaker a members' Slide Night was held and we were treated to a display of really first class slides by Arthur Austin,

Ted Felton, Mavis Gillies, Jim Imrie, Ern Walpole and Arthur Williams. Our Club is very fortunate in that we have in our midst such talented photographers. Thank you one and all for a superb display.

4) DISPOSAL of CHRISTMAS GOODS

As the festive season was fast approaching, our innovative Chairman decided to dispose of a bottle of vin de grape and a Christmas cake - Brian Archer and Tom Douglass were the lucky winners. Thanks to Fred van Gessel and Ted Felton who provided the prizes.

The evening was rounded off with refreshments provided by some of our female members - thank you ladies.

- 2. ATLAS WEEK-END to Warra/Warranulla/Waukivory 4/6/ December 1981.

 Due to excessively hot weather conditions forecast for the Saturday, this outing was confined to Sunday 6/12/81. Three members attended and recorded 92 species in the 3 grids covered during the day.
- 3. FIELD DAY to BLACK HILL Sunday 13th December 1981.

 In very hot and tiring conditions, 9 members spent the morning at Black Hill.

 Unfortunately for our Birdos the cicadas were in fine voice in the forest area and birds were hard to to find. Observations were made at the meeting place on John Renshaw Drive, at several spots along the road to Black Hill and finally from a vantage point above Hexham Swamp. 71 species were recorded with the highlights being the Rufous Fantail, the Grey Goshawk and the Whiskered Tern K.I.

4. CABBAGE TREE ISLAND TRIP - Sunday 10th January 1982.

Nine visitors from Sydney joined 11 Newcastle people on a sea trip to Cabbage Tree Island. Prime reason for the excursion was to view the GOULD PETREL which (in Australia) is only found there. The party was not disappointed as 3 Gould Petrels and one chick were sighted. In addition, other sightings were several species of Shearwaters including the rare Buller's Shearwater; Skuas: Gannets and the Little Penguin with a Leatherback Turtle thrown in for good measure. 5. FIELD DAY to WARKWORTH - Sunday 24th January 1982.

Ten members participated in the first Field Day for 1982. An early start was made for the venue at Warkworth where it was hoped to see the Painted Honeyeater. 72 species were recorded but unfortunately, the Painted H.E. was not one of them. The sighting of the day was a female GLOSSY BLACK COCKATOO (Calyptorhynchus lathami) who obligingly perched in a casuarina tree about 3 metres off the ground while she fed on casuarina nuts.

7 R.A.O.U. COURSES in 1982.

Details of Courses to be held at ROTMMAH Island Bird Observatory (in Victoria) and the Eyre Bird Observatory (in W.A.) are set out in a circular which has been tabled at this (February) Club Night. Incidentally, the R.A.O.U. are taking steps to establish a Bird Observatory at the Barren Grounds Nature Reserve (near Robertson - south of Wollongong).

8. ATLAS of AUSTRALIAN BIRDS.

The mammoth task of finding out where Australia's birds live and breed was finished on 31st December 1981 after 5 years of activity. About 2,500 Birdos have marshalled nearly 3 million records covering 750 species. By comparison, the British Bird Atlas involved 10,000 observers, 218 species and 285,000 individual records.

All of the Australian records are being computerised and in due course the results will be published.

9. EXHIBITION

An Exhibition of Australian Bird Paintings by Malcolm McNaughton opened at the Cooks Hill Galleries, 67 Bull St on Sunday 31st January. The Galleries will be open at the following times:
