 - b) BIRD of the EVERING Dot Bates

The Superb Lyrebird (Menura novaehollandiae) was dealt with in a very complete manner by Dot Bates. Dot imparted some interesting information relative to the history of the observations of this bird and also dwelt on the structure of the nest in addition to her comments about this master mimic of the bush.

c) BIRD CALL of the EVENING - Fred van Gessel

A call of the Spiny-cheeked Honeyeater (Acanthagenys rufogularis) was played by Fred, but members couldn't identify this one as it was a different call to the one we usually hear for the Spiny-cheeked.

d) BIRD JUIZ - Arthur Williams

Arthur bowled up some twenty questions covering a wide field of armithology of a specific and general nature. After completing this 'exam' most members present realised that they still had a lot to learn about birds in general. Thank you Arthur for a challenging set of questions.

As is usual at the last meeting for the year a raffle was conducted to augment Club funds. Prizes were donated by Ted Felton, Dot Bates and Jim Imrie and we thank them for their generosity. 2. HALF DAY FIELD DAY - Awabakal Field Study Centre - Sunday 9th January 1983.

The hot, consistent gusty winds and high temperatures certainly affected the number of birds observed on this first half-day outing and probably the number of members who attended.

A 7 a.m. start with five stalwart members who braved the unpleasant elements, later being joined by two prospective new members, Glen & Jillian Albrecht and their daught, Sarah.

The winds kept most birds low and there was none of the usual busy activity of the heathland honeyeaters.

Despite the adv erse conditions a total of 50 species was recorded, the highlights being the sighting of a Japanese Snipe disturbed at the edge of a rather depleted waterhole, a hunting Swamp Harrier being harried by other species and a flying fox who resented our intrusion.

Our thanks go to Bill Cambridge who capably led, and, despite our apparent lethargy, kept us on the move to various points of interest - the cliff face overlooking the sea, lagoon, dry sclerophyll forest and heatland . Wilma Barden.

3. SEA BIRD TRIP - Sunday 9th January 1983.

At Nelson Bay we boarded the launch which we had hired for the day. The trip out was a welcome change from the hot land. After about half an hour we anchored off Cabbage Tree Island. We were fortunate that the sea was calm, enabling us to be ferried to the island in a small boat. There are no sandy coves or other suitable landing spots. We all managed to jump off onto the rocks without getting wet.

A White-breasted Sea Eagle welcomed us and stayed perched in a dead tree for quite a while. Just near our landing rock, there was a Little Penguin nesting in a rock crevice. It came to the edge of its home to what all the noise was about.

Our two experts, Fred van Gessel and Bill Lane (Syrney visitor) went off rock-hopping up the gully in search of the GOULD PETREL. Sure enough and without much time passing, the call came - 'Here'. Two Gould Petrels and one egg were shown to the group. The birds were banded, admired and photographed by those members lucky enough to have brought their cameras. These beautiful birds nest only on Cabbage Tree Island (John Gould Nature Reserve) in rock piles and under cover of the palm forest. Without knowing where to look they could easily be missed.

Nearby was a different type of nest - a tunnel in the ground. It was that of the Wedge-tailed Shearwater. The bird was incubating one egg, about the same size as a domestic hen's egg. Another Shearwater was found wearing a very worn band so it was replaced. We hope to find out its age when records are checked.

We then rock-hopped up the gully to the top of the island and the view was well worth the effort. Other birds seen or heard on the island included Silvereyes, Yellow-faced honeyeater, Mistletoebird, Grey Thrush, Kookaburra, Pied Currawong, Raven and Reef Heron.

On rejoining our launch, we cruised out to sea. It was a bit like horse-riding but I think most members enjoyed the ride. Our Captain followed a fishing trawler and we all had good looks at hundreds of 'brown birds'. They included Wedge-tailed Shearwaters, Flesh-footed Shearwaters and a Pomarine Skua. It was a most impressive sight even for those who had seen it before. The birds seemed to come from everywhere. The total species number for the day was 24.

4. THE CRESTED HAWK (Aviceda subcristata)

On 16/1/83 I was riding my bike along a track near ry home in Rankin Park. I noticed a large bird flying, I got some adults to come and observe this bird. It was a CRESTED HAWK perching in a tree. Almost right away an adult bird came flying in with a lizard to feed this large baby. On closer observation we noticed that there were two immatures and one adult.

In Australia the Crested Hawk lives in two separate regions, one down the Great Dividing Range from Cape York to about 280 kilometres south of Sydney and the other from Roper River through Arnhem Land and the Kimberleys to Fitzroy River. It has never been recorded more than 350 kilometres inland. It lives in eucalypt woodlands.

5. A COMMON NODDY 7

On Thursday 6/1/83 1715-1800 hours, while paddling a surf ski at Blacksmiths Beach, a dark grey bird was noticed in a flock of Common Terms and Silver Gulls.

The bird was dark grey all over with the exception of a white or light grey area from the forehead to the crown. This light coloured area did not appear to go beyond the crown. The bill and legs were both dark. The tail when fanned in slow speed manoeuvres appeared to be slightly rounded with a definite notch in the centre. The wings appeared to be slightly shorter, broader and not as sharply pointed as the wings of the Common Tern. The bird was about the same size as the Common Terns.

When feeding, the bird took its food from the surface of the water while in flight. It was also seen flying slowly a few feet above the beach where it made numerous changes of directions - it was apparently searching for food although it was not observed taking anything from the beach. A Common Noddy? Bill Cambridge.

As we pulled up to visit the property of George Pope, this bird was sighted on a small wet area at the side of the road and was eventually sighted by most of the group.

Once inside the property, a bird of prey was heard and on investigation it was found to be a COLLARED SPARKOWHAWK carrying prey which proved to be a Peaceful Dove. One young was also sighted.

From here we went on to Fred Hullman's property at the Gap Creek Reserve.

All told a total of species was seen for the day. Thanks are due to Ray
Walker who led this outing in his usual inimitable style.

At all times of the day persons with 'nockies' could be seen (or heard) combing the gullies, the forests and river flats looking for considerate feathered species to pop out to be observed and counted in the official H.B.O.C. list for the weekend.

What was seen ? Ten species of the Columbidae family including Wompoos, White-headed and Topknot Pigeons; a POWERFUL OWL devouring a Tawny Frogmouth; 2 or 3 Lyrebirds; Peregrine and Little Falcons; Spectacled Flycatcher and Red-backed Wrens to name some.

For many there were no new birds but Rosemary and Pat had an "Owl of a time" learning about the new birds they saw at the Camp. All agreed on the success of the week-end and many thought it the best yet.
