- 1. NOTES FROM THE FEBRUARY 1983 MEETING Wednesday 9th February 1983.
  - a) Attendance 35 A welcome was extended to two new members: Michael Noonan and Bill Reedman.
    - b) Annual Meeting The first part of the evening was taken up with business pertaining to the Annual Meeting - principal aspects of which were:
      - i) The President's Annual Report this was a concise sum ary of the year's activities and achievements. Membership had increased by over 53% and at the close of the year stood at 69; despite a heavy outlay on the purchase of Club B adges (\$253) income for the year exceeded expenditure and the opening balance for 1983 is \$183; during the year a Club Library was established and the Library catalogue lists some 18 v lumes; the GOLDEN WHISTLER was selected as our Club emblem; Club badges bearing this emblem were purchased and to date over 50% of the initial order have been sold.

c) BIRD CALL OF THE EVENING - Sue Hamonet

The call of the beautiful Red-crowned Pigeon was the one chosen by Sue for the enlightenment of members - by contrast the call of the Purple-crowned Pigeon was also played but was not nearly as pleasant to listen to as the former.

d) BIRD OF THE EVENING - Bill Cambridge

The FRECKLED DUCK (Stictonetta naevosa) being very much in the news of late, Bill thought it very appropriate to have it as the Bird of the Evening.

The meaning of the Scientific name is as follows: STICTOS = freckled; NETTA = duck; NAEVOSA = spotted.

Large numbers of these birds are currently inhabitating local wetland areas. due no doubt to the dry conditions west of the ranges. For identification purposes, the best guide is the unusual shape of the head and during the breeding season, the upper part of the bill of the male is a bright red.
