


'playing with the tongue' and its strong sweet song can be heard all day and sometimes well into the night. In Sue's opinion it has the most joyful song of all Honeyeaters. The Brown Honeyeater is common north and west of Newcastle, and can be found in the mangroves at Kooragang, at Teralba and Shortland.

- d) Observations: Among observations noted were three young Channel-billed Cuckoos being fed by one pair of Currawongs at Valentine, a pair of Dollar Birds raising four young at Buttaba, and a Blue-faced Honeyeater at Rankin Park. We were reminded that there are seven different Observation Books wherein members are asked to record sightings.
- e) Main Feature: In place of Gary Weber who was unable to come, Bill Wohlreb volunteered to show some of the slides he has taken over the past ten years. His selection ranged from far afield to slides of Little Grebes nesting on the pond in front of the Club room. Slides of nesting Wrens, Pardalotes and Bee-eaters were particularly good, those of Rainbow Lorikeets were spledid, but everyones' favourite was a close-up shot of a nesting Yellow Robin. Thanks Bill, and we wish you well for your proposed move to Queensland.

2. FIELD DAY TO STRICKLAND FOREST, SUNDAY 21ST FEBRUARY.

Seven hardy members gathered at All Seasons Nursery, Ourimbah at 0700, two late-comers from the bush at 0706. Off we went to the Banksia Picnic Area via Dog Trap Road.

A meander on walking trails through rain forest down to Stoney Creek produced 41 bird species. On the return walk on a fire trail Ruth spotted a Rose Robin, the highlight of the day. This Robin is aptly described as 'a little gem of Birdlife'. Leeches were plentiful, some members being well blooded - George Rogers topscoring with eight. After morning coffee, a short walk yielded a Rock Warbler.

Lunch was at Woodberry's Inn Park, followed by a brief visit to Ourimbah State Forest and then home. Total species for the day 51, plus one bat.
