Vale Graeme O'Connor

In early April this year we lost an HBOC stalwart, Graeme O'Connor, after his lengthy battle with cancer. I can't exactly remember when I first met Graeme, but it must have been at an HBOC camp sometime in the mid-1980s. Graeme, initially with his son James and later with his wife Barbara, was a very keen camper, over the years bringing an array of different caravans to our many and far-flung camping spots. At those camps, Graeme would walk huge distances, always finding lots of interesting birds which he

would delightedly report during the bird call at the end of each day. Graeme was also a regular at the post-dinner sessions around the campfire, chuckling at other people's stories in that special way of his, and telling plenty of stories too.

Graeme was HBOC's Activities Officer for several years in the 1990s, and always was able to put

together a program of visits to an interesting range of habitats and bird species. He also organised our first ever pelagic trip, from Port Stephens in 1992. That wasn't a hugely successful trip, in that we didn't get very far beyond Broughton Island and several people were seasick even before we'd passed the heads! However, we did see a couple of albatross species. Graeme then became a very keen and regular participant in the pelagics from Swansea which started in 2000, and later the trips from Nelson Bay.



Graeme was a very active birder both within the Hunter Region and Australia-wide. His Hunter tally of 385 species seen is very impressive. I can recall a few times when Graeme would pull up on his way to or from his work shift at Tomago, to chase down a report of some vagrant species. Our last joint Hunter twitch was for the SIPO on Newcastle Bight in June 2019; we crossed paths along the beach, Graeme with a big grin as he was on his way back from finding the bird. Unfortunately, because of failing health, he was unable to try for the Roseate Tern at Old Bar this summer.

Graeme's Australian tally was in the high 600s. I was with him on a Torres Strait tour in 2006, when we both added ten or so species to our Australian lists, and I know that several others from HBOC did birding trips with Graeme over the years eg to Iron Range, Northern Territory, Bamaga/Cape York. He was great company.

Graeme's birding also had a serious side. For a while he was an active bird bander, working with others at sites around the Wetlands Centre on a study of wetland passerines. Later, he became a volunteer with the NPWS Gould's Petrel project on Cabbage Tree Island, making several visits to help monitor the status of the seabird population.

We'll all miss Graeme very much. In this time of the Covid-19 outbreak and community lockdown, it's so unfortunate that we weren't allowed to join together with Barbara and family to mourn Graeme's passing plus celebrate his contributions to the joy of birding. I hope that when normal life resumes, there can be a way found for us to do that.
